

<p>3 Quick tips for parents</p>	<p>Suggest families look for the fairy tales characters and read those stories, or read some more Nick Sharratt books</p> <p>Talk about the importance of children hearing rhymes and sounds in language to help with later reading and writing at school- if they can hear where words sound the same, this is a strategy used in reading to work out unknown words.</p> <p>Explain every time children share a story they learn more words-don't give up on those popular books they ask for every night.</p>
